Recipes

Once again, Ben Carlson provides us with a recipe, and we are grateful for his suggestions! Ben found this cake recipe in a 1932 magazine ad for Royal Baking Powder. He says it was easy to make and very delicious.

THREE EGG ANGEL CAKE

Mix well and sift together 4 times: 1 cup sugar, 1 1/3 cups flour, 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar, 3 tsp. baking powder and 1/3 tsp salt

Add: 2/3 cup scalded milk very slowly. While still warm, beating continually, add 1 tsp. almond extract or 1 tsp. vanilla extract. Mix well and fold in 3 egg whites which have been beaten until light.

Pour mixture into ungreased angel cake tin.

Bake 350 degrees about 45 minutes. Remove from oven. Invert pan and allow to stand until cold, then add icing.

ICING: Add 1/2 tsp. melted butter to 2 Tbsp. hot milk and gradually add 1 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar (powdered sugar); add 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract and spread.

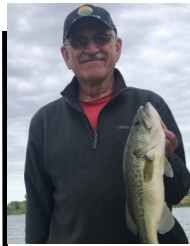

Exploring the Lenten Journey

We've begun our Lenten journey. Many Christians talk a lot about Lent, but have we ever explored its origin, history, and meaning? I invite you to join in a way-too-brief exploration into Lent. Hopefully we learn something new or are reminded of this rich spiritual tradition!

What's in the Name?

The word most American Christians use has more to do with the natural season than any liturgical season. "Lent" derives from an old English word for spring. Christians in other lands who use other languages tend to employ a more liturgically focused term. In Latin, the season is *Quadragesima*, and modern Greeks call it Σαρακοστή (*Sarakostí*). Both terms mean "fortieth." This tradition carries on in Spanish (*cuaresma*), French (*carême*), and even Swahili (*kwaresima*). Other Christians name the season after its practices. Czech, German, and Norwegian speakers call it a "fasting period" (*postní doba*, *Fastenzeit*, and *fasten*, respectively). Despite the many words used to describe the season, all Christians refer to more or less the same idea: the days leading up to the crucifixion and resurrection.

When did it start?

While Christians generally agree the season today reflects Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness (Mk 1.12–13; Mt 4.1–11; Lk 4.1–13), how this observance came about is not so settled. Tradition assumed the season of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer developed out of reverence for the Great Three Days—Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Vigil of Easter. This Holiest Week necessitated the utmost honor, and the days prior prepared a person to rightly observe the Passion. More recent scholarship has discovered the opposite, that Lent may have extended after the baptism of Jesus, a history more reflective of the Gospel narratives.

The historical record demonstrates a Lenten observation of some sort practiced through Christian communities as early as the first and second centuries. By the Council of Nicaea (325 AD), a more uniform pre-paschal (Easter) fast was adopted by Christendom. Sermons preserved from this period of Christianity demonstrate the connection with Jesus' baptism, death, and resurrection. The time between Epiphany and Easter then was ideal for preparing new believers for their own baptism. The catechumen would engage in rigorous preparation leading up to their own baptism at the Easter Vigil.

As Christianity spread as a dominant religion, fewer adults came to the faith unbaptized. Thus, the medieval church's observation of the time between Epiphany and Easter shifted from a season of preparation to a season of penance. Greater focus was placed on the sinfulness of a believer. Rather than Jesus' temptation in the wilderness, Lent focused more heavily on the Passion of Christ.

We today are more accustomed to a blend of the early church and the medieval church. In the last 200 years or so, the season of Lent has been reexamined. The baptismal tradition has been renewed, with many receiving the holy sacrament during the Easter celebration. Yet there remains a penitential bend. Many still give something desirable up during the season to join in Christ's suffering, even if in only a small way. We also witness a greater emphasis on the focus of prayer and almsgiving. Churches and ministerial communities hold midweek services during Lent, and the offering is often collected for public needs, rather than the congregation proper.

So, What's the Point?

This might sound crass, but it remains a good question. Why do we, as Christians in this 2023rd year of our Lord, set aside forty days (not counting Sundays) from Ash Wednesday through Easter Sunday? On the one hand, we join a biblical and theological tradition of “keeping time.” We know *Chronos* time, or clock time (think chronological), but we also get glimpses of *Kairos* time, or proper/opportune time. This is God’s time, and the Resurrection is perhaps the greatest example of it as such. Easter becomes a central point of the church year, and each other Sunday is a sort of “mini-Easter.” But as we prepare for our Sunday assemblies, we likewise prepare for the Easter celebration (which is not one day, or even a week, but a week’s worth of weeks—seven Sundays!)

This relates to a second reason we observe the season of Lent: it is good and right to fast, give alms, and be in prayer. Really, these are things—good works—that we should be doing in response to the faith instilled in us by God through Christ in the first place. Here is where our English term for the season can be helpful. The *Kairos* season of resurrection corresponds with our *Chronos* season of Spring. With Spring comes new life and rebirth. We witness these little examples of resurrection all around us. May we join in the reminder of God bringing about life in the (need, life-giving practices we follow during this season.

Pastor Hillary and I look forward to journeying these (now slightly less than) forty days with you. You’re invited to join us for a mid-week lunch worship in Osceola area (Wednesdays at 11:45a) or Butler County (Fridays at 12:05p); mid-week dinner and Holden Evening Prayer at Calvary Swede Home (6:00p); or explore examples of faith in Genoa as Augustana and Genoa Methodist share worship spaces on Wednesday evenings (7:00p). And, it’s not too late to sign up for the Lenten daily devotions.

In conclusion, grace to you on this Lenten journey.

By God’s mercy may we all gather at the Cross and Resurrection.
