Go and... Be Honest



"If I'm being honest..." We may have heard those words before. Maybe from a caring friend; maybe from a critical supervisor; maybe from someone else. No matter who's saying, "If I'm being honest," the truth that follows tends to be one that

might hurt. In an attempt to soften the blow, the truth giver reminds you that honesty is a virtue. Honesty is something we strive for, and, even when it is hard, we should tell the truth. Of course, if we're being honest, that's sometimes easier said than done.

Maybe that is because people *prefer* convenient, comfortable lies so much more than honest truths. Psychologists who study human behavior and how our brains work find this to be true time and time again. We seek comfort, stability, and status quo. The honest truth tends to bring up discomfort, it might shift our foundation a little, it rocks the boat that, at least in our honest opinion, has been sailing smooth. Yet, without honesty, we fall into complacency. We stop reflecting on who we are and how we live. Without truth tellers, we stop growing because we stop being challenged. We fail to thrive in a world that most certainly changes around us.

In 1 John 3:18, the author writes, "Little children, let's not love with words or speech but with action and truth" (CEB). To "Go and Be Honest" means not only *speaking* the honest truth but *living* it. Because just as often as we speak honesty, we also must live honestly. That means receiving comments in the best possible light and taking the time and making the effort to hear a person's honest remarks. It means living truthfully even when there is no consequence.

At the same time, as researcher Brené Brown reflects, sometimes, we are not all that honest while trying to be honest. She writes, "Honesty is the best policy, but honesty that's motivated by shame, anger, fear, or hurt is not 'honesty.' It's shame, anger, fear, or hurt disguised as honesty." If we're being honest with ourselves, these words sting because there *is* some

truth there. Being honest is not only some external thing expressed toward others. There is a self-reflective aspect of honesty in which we tell, and listen, to the honest truths in ourselves.

When we "Go and Be Honest," we live faithfully into who God has created and called us to be. And not only to be, but who we are to become. God is not finished with you yet. And that's the truth. May we all hear Jesus' words in John 8, "You are truly my disciples if you remain faithful to my teaching. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (vv. 31b–32). It is through Christ alone that we can go and do anything, let alone be honest. So let us honor our Lord Jesus Christ through honest living, in truth telling, and in living out the Good News in a world in need. Amen.

BEST EVER POTATO SOUP

(From 2000 "Quick Cooking Annual Recipes")

6 Bacon Strips, diced

3 cups cubed peeled potatoes

1 (14 1/2 oz.) can chicken broth

1 small carrot, chopped or shredded

½ cup chopped onion

1 TBSP. dried parsley flakes

½ tsp. salt

½ tsp. pepper

3 TBSP all purpose flour

3 cups milk

8 oz. Light Velveeta cheese, cubed

In a large saucepan or stockpot, cook bacon until crisp, then drain. Add potatoes, broth, carrot, onion, parsley, salt & pepper to bacon. Cover & simmer until potatoes are tender, about 15 minutes. Combine flour & milk until smooth. Add to soup. Bring soup to a boil; boil and stir for 2 minutes (set timer). Add cheese; stir until cheese is melted and soup is heated through.

Yield – about 2 quarts (8 servings)

This was enjoyed by workers after highway litter pick up, and they recommended including this recipe in the newsletter, it was so popular. Enjoy! Cheryl Jones

(Through trial and error, I've learned this doesn't do well when I tried to double the recipe. It can be increased a little successfully, like 3 ½ - 4 cups potatoes with 4 cups milk and 4 TBSP flour, but if you need more, try cooking it in extra batches, or it will curdle).



He later went to Central Community College in Columbus to study respiratory therapy, but did not finish that degree, as he was needed to be a caregiver to his parents.

Ben enjoys many creative hobbies, which include painting and sketching, gardening (shared that love with his mom), building willow furniture and baskets, and a baker, enjoying recipes from his mom, grandma and great grandmother. He also enjoys photography and genealogy.

One of Ben's goals in life is to live to the age of 105. He has never married or had children, but enjoys being "Uncle Ben" to Jim and Bonnie's grandchildren.

He feels really blessed to have Swede Home as his church family. He enjoys helping arrange flower arrangements and bake cookies for the ice cream social and cookies for coffee after church. He's also been helpful in providing food and working for "Meals from the Heart". We are blessed to have Ben at Swede Home!


